## CRIMINAL JUSTICE REFORM

The Foundation began discussing the need to be "smart on crime."

2012

Governor Nathan Deal instituted a series of bills reforming Georgia's criminal justice system.

## TAXES

90's

The Foundation began espousing the need for lower, flatter and broader state income tax to make Georgia more economically competitive with its neighbors.

2011

Special tax-reform council proposes lower rates, ending exemptions, taxing consumption (goods and services).

The General Assembly lowered the state's top income-tax rate for the first time.

2018

NOW

Lawmakers are looking at ways to reform income tax in the state.

## MOBILITY

The Foundation began promoting managed lanes as a solution to metro Atlanta's traffic congestion.

2003

The Foundation proposed Bus Rapid Transit.

2011

Georgia began building a network of managed lanes in the region.

2013

Metro Atlanta embraced Bus Rapid Transit projects.

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## SCHOOL CHOICE

90's

The Foundation began championing education choice, including promoting charter schools.

2004

Foundation-led STEM charter school, Tech High School, opened in APS.

2008

The Foundation began championing raising the cap on the state's highly popular tax-credit scholarship program in order to increase options for students and families.

2015

The Foundation began championing education scholarship accounts, a tool to allow Georgia families to spend the state dollars allocated for their children's education on private school tuition, homeschooling materials, virtual education & more.

Legislators raised the cap on the tax-credit scholarship program for the third time.

2018

NOW

Legislators are considering the passage of education scholarship accounts.

## HEALTHCARE

1995

The Foundation began promoting reforming Georgia's Certificate of Need laws, which unnecessarily restrict competition among healthcare providers.

The Foundation promoted Direct Primary Care.

2014

The Foundation endorsed liberating Georgia's healthcare market from federal regulations for the Medicaid program and Affordable Care Act subsidies.

2019

An initial Certificate of Need reform passed the General Assembly.

2018

Direct Primary Care passed the legislature.

ACA and Medicaid discussions are underway with Governor Kemp's administration.
